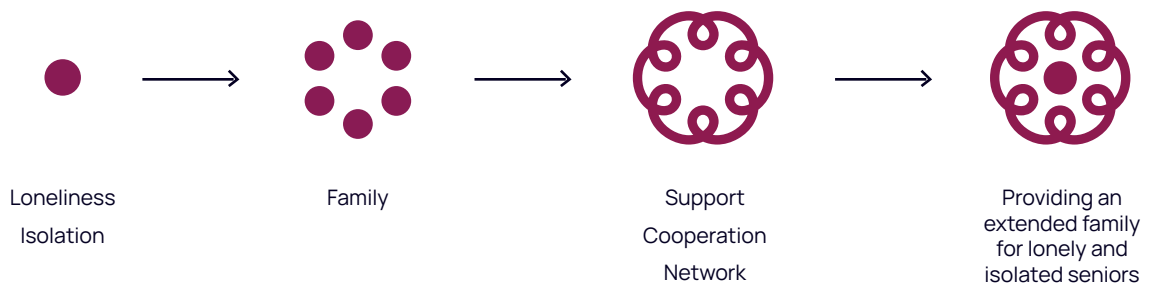

Message from the Administration

Renewed Friendships and New Challenges for Little Brothers' 60th Anniversary

Without a doubt, the last two years have been particularly difficult for seniors. After a slow but gradual return to our normal activities over the past few months, our Great Friends, volunteers, and teams in the field were overjoyed at the chance to get together again in person. At Little Brothers, we were delighted to see that the sense of belonging, caring and solidarity towards seniors was still alive and well within our organization. And that we continue to be inspired by these values, which have been at the heart of our mission for the past 60 years.

Many fruitful and enriching exchanges took place with our various partners over the past year, and this collaborative approach has clearly strengthened each of the organizations that offer support for the elderly. Little Brothers provides a voice for older citizens, particularly those suffering from social isolation, and it is encouraging to see that our message is being spread by the media and that efforts are being made to raise awareness about this issue. The pandemic has also given us the opportunity to reinvent ourselves, update our technology, and renew our branding.

As the population ages, we must adjust our strategies and adapt our methods. It is estimated that 55,000 elderly people in Quebec are currently suffering from social isolation. In the last year, Little Brothers had an impact on the lives of 2,636 isolated seniors; we are aiming to support 10,000 by the year 2030. The Little Brothers Foundation will play a crucial role in increasing the funding and outreach of our organization, to ensure the sustainability of our mission.

For 60 years, Little Brothers has provided a loving and caring community for seniors with important social and relational needs. But we want to do more. This means increasing the number of volunteers, getting them more involved and creating new partnerships. Maximizing work organization and efforts will enable us to welcome a greater number of Great Friends into our extended family. We also wish to obtain a more substantial involvement from the government. By working collectively and promoting solidarity, we will be able to deliver an effective response to this devastating social issue.

Seniors are an important pillar of our social structure. They must be loved and respected as they deserve to be, and as each of one of us would like to be. Tomorrow, each one of us could experience social isolation.

The Little Brothers family would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have contributed in some way to our cause over the past year. A special mention goes out to our teams and volunteers who have shown admirable flexibility and dedication during the pandemic. We would like to thank you for your invaluable contribution and resilience during this difficult time. We hope that you will continue to work alongside Little Brothers for many years to come, offering the prospect of a warm and secure future to all seniors in Quebec.

It is our mission to keep solidarity and compassion in the spotlight for the next 60 years!

Past, Present and Future: An Ongoing Commitment to the Elderly

After 60 years of dedication and solidarity, Little Brothers is preparing for the future with renewed enthusiasm and sense of purpose. Although the pandemic greatly disrupted our operations over the last two years, we remained true to our values and did our utmost to pursue our important mission with isolated seniors.

The past year has seen a gradual return to certain local activities and events. Teams and volunteers from our different regional offices were able to reconnect with our Great Friends, who needed them more than ever. It was truly gratifying to offer them a comforting presence and an opportunity to socialize. Not surprisingly, we found that confinement had had an extremely detrimental effect on our Great Friends' health and living conditions. The cancellation of outings and lack of stimulation, the decrease in various public services and spiralling inflation aggravated situations that were already precarious. Feelings of isolation and insecurity increased, and the cognitive abilities, physical and mental health of our aging population were considerably affected.

During this difficult period, Little Brothers never ceased its efforts to support isolated seniors. We did, however, face many challenges while attempting to fulfill our role. Evolving vaccine requirements, frequent changes in public health guidelines, and unpredictable conditions certainly made the job difficult. 2022 was also marked by a labor shortage and Little Brothers was not spared in this regard, both in terms of staff and volunteers. Despite these challenges, as soon as the public health situation improved, we put all our energy into meeting the immediate needs of our Great Friends. Driven by our desire to provide warmth and companionship, we resumed our visits and all social activities when circumstances allowed.

We are proud to have organized a beautiful virtual event in November in tribute to the elders who passed away during the year. And despite the confinement, we managed to distribute gifts that made eyes sparkle at Christmas. Vacation getaways and picnics in the park were additional highlights of 2021. Finally, we had the honor of inaugurating two new Little Brothers divisions in Granby and in Gatineau and are certain that they will contribute significantly to supporting the elderly in the Montérégie and Outaouais regions.

On behalf of Little Brothers, we would like to extend our warmest thanks to all the volunteers, field workers and teams who devoted themselves unconditionally to our Great Friends during the pandemic, as they have done for the past 60 years! Their involvement was essential in providing a breath of fresh air to those who needed it the most.

We hope you will be a part of our family for many years to come!

Our Impact



Little Brothers is Present Throughout Quebec

Thanks to the considerable efforts of **2,907 volunteers** and **95 employees** throughout 12 administrative regions in Quebec, Little Brothers extended family made a real difference in the lives of 2,636 elderly persons in 2021-2022.

Little Brothers was also present throughout the province through our telephone companionship program, which reached 356 Great Friends this year, thanks to the help of 324 volunteers.

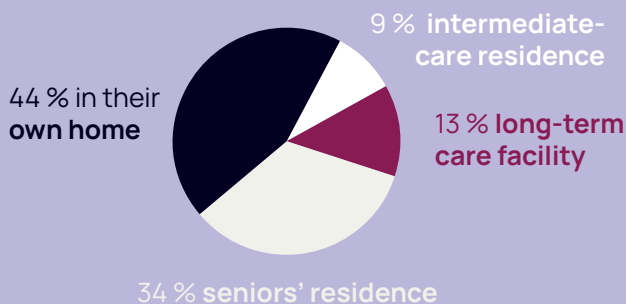

2021

August

Post-COVID get together with our Great Friends

The easing of sanitary restrictions made many people happy at Little Brothers! In each region, our teams were delighted to be able to meet up with their Great Friends and volunteers for picnics and other summer activities. What a huge sigh of relief and a renewed sense of belonging!

November

Tribute to our Great Friends who passed away

Throughout the month of November, Little Brothers paid tribute to the Great Friends who passed away during the year. Across Quebec, our teams and volunteers organized a number of events to honour the memory of those women and men who have crossed our paths.

December

A heartfelt Christmas initiative

Our teams and volunteer squads busily delivered Advent calendars to our Great Friends throughout Quebec. Several initiatives were launched in December to show kindness, dignity, respect, and appreciation for the seniors we support during this significant but sometimes difficult time of year.



October

October 1st - International Day of Older Persons

As part of the International Day of Older Persons, Little Brothers organized a virtual show entitled *Avec vous jusqu'au bout*, presented by Quebecor in partnership with Desjardins. Many local artists joined with us to declare their appreciation for Quebec's seniors.

January

Phon-o-thon

For the 23rd consecutive year, Little Brothers staff took time to call donors and thank them for their generosity. While this Phon-o-thon certainly gave rise to many heartfelt and enriching conversations, above all, it allowed us to better get to know our benefactors and to take full measure of their affection for elders.

March

March 11 - National Day of remembrance for victims of COVID-19

On the second anniversary of the pandemic, Little Brothers held a commemorative ceremony to honour the lives of elderly persons who died during the pandemic. It was a truly fitting way to highlight the last moments of their lives and to show that they will not be forgotten. Whereas 6 % of our Great Friends died from COVID-19 in 2021, only 1 % of deaths were attributable to the virus in 2022.

Volunteer appreciation

Each year, Little Brothers teams highlight the exceptional commitment of volunteers throughout Quebec who brighten up the lives of their Great Friends. During this special week, our teams mobilized to pay tribute to the volunteers who have been involved for many years or who have distinguished themselves in an exceptional way. Small gifts, treats and awards were distributed.



April

Easter

As we do every year, Little Brothers celebrated Easter with its extended family throughout Quebec. Since the pandemic protocols still prohibited large gatherings, our Little Brothers teams once again demonstrated their boundless creativity by delivering flowers, greeting cards and gift packages filled with small treats.

April 24-30 - Volunteer Week 2022

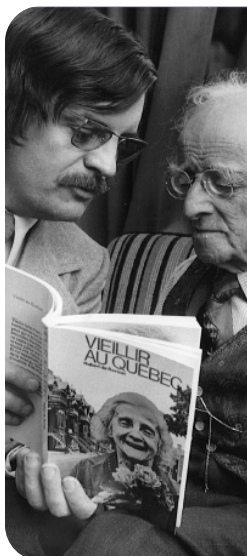

Tribute to Hubert de Ravinel

On February 14, a pillar of our organization passed away. Co-founder of Les Petits Frères du Québec, Hubert de Ravinel died at the age of 88 surrounded by his loved ones.

Born in Fontainebleau, France, Hubert de Ravinel first joined *Les Petits Frères des Pauvres* in Paris. A disciple of Armand Marquiset (founder of the organization), he left France for Chicago to bring Little Brothers' mission to North America and pursue his desire to restore dignity and joy to elderly people suffering from loneliness. In 1963, he arrived in Quebec and co-founded Les Petits Frères de Montréal, serving as its director until 1977.

Little Brothers would never have come into existence in Québec without the commitment of Hubert de Ravinel, who devoted his whole life to bringing joy to older persons with humanity, consistency, courage, dedication, and discretion. We would like to express our eternal gratitude on behalf of all those he touched during his lifetime.

2021-2022 IN REVIEW

Companionship Programs and Projects

The Wellness Program

The Little Brothers Wellness Program improves the quality of life for Great Friends by allowing them to purchase items and equipment that affect everyday life, such as glasses, a prosthesis, a hearing aid, a dental device, a wheelchair, a mechanical bed, an air conditioner, household appliances, etc.

In 2021-2022

58 seniors saw their quality of life improve thanks to this program, for which \$32,863 were allocated as follows:

- 34 % dental care
- 23 % purchase of equipment and specialized care
- 9 % food aid

Isolation due to Covid-19, the rising cost of living, the lack of workers and volunteers have severely affected vulnerable organizations and seniors, and all of these factors have led to a higher demand for basic needs such as food aid.

Food Insecurity Project

The Food Insecurity Project, which aims to prevent malnutrition among seniors, has five objectives: inform, identify, support, strengthen connections between organizations and prevent food insecurity and undernutrition. This project has become an integral part of our support for our Great Friends and is carried out in collaboration with local institutions and organizations.

Launched in 2020, this initiative, supported by La Ville de Montréal and developed with the help of several important partners, including the Direction régionale de santé publique (DRSP) and the Université de Sherbrooke's research center, is being carried out in several stages:

- Creation of an advisory committee made up of experts in the field, including Paule Lebel, MD at the DRSP and Nancy Presse, Dietitian-Nutritionist and professor at the Université de Sherbrooke;
- Survey developed and approved by the DRSP, and carried out by volunteers to gather accurate information regarding malnutrition among our Great Friends;
- Creation of an information kit, which will be distributed to over 60 employees, 950 volunteers and 1,960 Great Friends;
- Training and conference in collaboration with the Université de Sherbrooke.

Dreams Come True for our Great Friends

Just like all of us, our Great Friends have long nourished dreams they would like to fulfill. Without a doubt, offering them the possibility to realize a major project brings hope and joy. As their extended family, we take an interest in their dreams and do all we can to make them come true.

Madame Thérèse, 86 years of age, completed a **pilgrimage to the Ermitage in Saint-Antoine du Lac Bouchette** this year. Accompanied by a volunteer, she was able to enjoy an excursion that she had wanted to realize for many years.

Our Great Friend Gilles-Florent, 75 years old, attended a **Laval Rocket's hockey game** during the spring playoffs. As a strong supporter of the team, he was delighted to be able to cheer them on at that crucial time of the year.

Accompanied by his Little Brothers companion, Mr. Gérard, 86 years of age, was finally able to **visit his sister-in-law in Val-Alain**. Because they live so far from one another, this long-awaited reunion was indeed quite emotional.



RABQ Tip Sheets: Getting Informed to Provide Better Support for Seniors

In collaboration with the *Réseau de l'action bénévole du Québec* (RABQ), we published 20 new Tip Sheets last April to better equip volunteers and caregivers who provide support for vulnerable seniors. These information sheets address certain challenges and problems they may encounter in their interactions with the elderly.

In particular, they improve our companions' ability to:

- support gains, losses and transitions related to ageing;
- understand the difference between mental health disorders and cognitive deficits;
- identify situations of abuse.

This project was made possible thanks to the valuable contribution and financial support of the *Réseau de l'action bénévole du Québec* (RABQ), which represents 36 provincial organizations, 7 local organizations and a total of 1.6 million volunteers across Quebec.

Friendly Voice Program

Friendly Voice is a simple and secure telephone companionship program that pairs lonely seniors over 75 with volunteers who are specially trained in active listening and support for the elderly. The elderly partner can converse with the same volunteer on a regular basis, once a week.

As of July 31, 2022, 356 Great Friends were actively supported through this program. Next year, it will be redesigned and enhanced and will take the name *Near You*. Although the program will continue to provide seniors in remote areas with the opportunity to talk on the telephone, it will also aim to offer in-person and correspondence options.

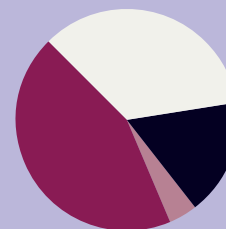

Juliette Huot Award for exemplary commitment



Little Brothers has chosen to present the Juliette Huot Award to **Andrée Ruel**. A volunteer in Quebec City for 10 years, she was paired with six Great Friends simultaneously during the pandemic. Speaking Up for the Elderly

Little Brothers has been speaking up for older persons since 1962. In this capacity, we attend various events related to geriatrics each year. These conferences and forums are important for sharing our expertise, engaging with partners, learning from others, and building a strong network. They also provide the opportunity to raise awareness about the elderly and improve the way they are viewed by society.



États généraux de la Coalition pour la dignité des aînés (3 May 2022)

Little Brothers is determined to speak up for the elderly so that their voices may be heard.

On May 3, Caroline Sauriol, Executive Director of the Little Brothers Foundation, took part in the *États généraux de la Coalition pour la dignité des aînés*.

This event, a first in Quebec, brought together more than 90 people representing 40 organizations concerned with issues affecting the well-being and dignity of seniors. The purpose of the forum was to establish ties between the government and various community organizations and associations, with the expectation that this will lead to more concrete decision-making and action.

These events are essential for strengthening relations with our partners. They allow us to speak with a strong, united voice that accurately reflects the reality of vulnerable seniors. By combining our efforts, we can influence society's perception of the elderly and reiterate the urgent need to fight against social isolation.

Vivre et vieillir à Québec (8 June 2022, UN ET UN FONT MILLE)

For Little Brothers, it is essential to ensure lifelong support for the elderly, regardless of their situation or their physical, psychological, or social condition.

In this vein, Caroline Sauriol joined panellists for an event entitled *Vivre et vieillir à Québec*, in Quebec City. This pertinent initiative by the collective Un et un font mille focused on the theme "How do we want to age?" (*Comment voulons-nous habiter notre vieillesse?*)

By looking at three different types of spaces - intimate spaces (body, health, intimacy), living spaces (housing, accommodation) and social spaces (community, society, environment) - participants were able to examine and analyze already existing approaches. But more importantly, they were able to shed light on what strategies still need to be developed to meet the growing challenges of an ageing population.

It is by taking part in such events that we can raise awareness about the specific experience of older persons, find solutions to better protect them and build an inclusive society in which life is enjoyable at every stage.

\$15,000 emergency fund to help Ukrainian seniors

Our solidarity with the elderly goes beyond borders. In Ukraine, millions of people over the age of 60 are currently living in a state of war. Our Foundation has decided to join forces with the International Federation of the Little Brothers of the Poor to support them. It is imperative for us to show support for Ukrainian seniors in these trying times.

True to its mission and values, Little Brothers made a \$15,000 emergency relief fund donation to the International Federation in support of the Starenki Foundation, a charitable organization dedicated to helping isolated and vulnerable seniors in the Ukraine. This exceptional emergency contribution comes from surplus internal funds that the Little Brothers Foundation Board of Directors had previously set aside.





The Community Mobilizes

Aware of the challenges and difficulties experienced by seniors during the pandemic, several businesses and groups of individuals joined forces with us to alleviate social isolation among older persons. Despite the many sanitary constraints imposed by the pandemic, they showed their incredible creativity and unwavering solidarity by organizing a multitude of activities in support of Little Brothers.

Thank you for this significant and heartfelt mobilization for our elders!



Minifondo Garneau-Québecor

Due to the sanitary restrictions in place at the time, a smaller event - the Minifondo - replaced the traditional Granfondo Garneau-Québecor this year. To avoid overly large gatherings, the activity was open to members of the Garneau-Québec Cycling Club and employees of Louis Garneau Sports only.

More than 100 cyclists met on Sunday, August 8, 2021, at 9 a.m. to ride for the cause. 30, 80 and 100 km routes were created for the event.

\$45,868 was raised in support of the Little Brothers and this sum will be added to the more than \$700,000 already collected over the past 12 years.

I am Tomorrows' Elder Campaign - Luc Maurice Foundation

Le Groupe Maurice unveiled its campaign to combat ageism, starring actress Julie Lebreton. The Quebec actress also committed to the fight against ageism by donating **\$1,500** to Little Brothers. Additional donations were made by Grégory Charles (\$500) and the Luc Maurice Foundation (\$2,000).

Christmas Activities

As part of the Christmas 2021 operations, **Intact Insurance** reached out to its staff who contributed generously to ensure a great holiday season for isolated seniors. Thanks to their donation of **\$25,000**, more than 2,400 chocolate advent calendars were distributed to our Great Friends across the province.

Giving Tuesday 2021 - Fondation Santé

On Giving Tuesday, the national day of giving that precedes the holiday season, Fondation Santé launched an initiative to double donations collected for our organization. A total of 585 donors and friends took part in Giving Tuesday, raising \$51,700 in support of isolated seniors in Quebec, to which *Fondation Santé* added its contribution of **\$25,000**, for a total of \$76,700. This precious gift enabled us to make a concrete difference, in particular through the Wellness Program and birthday celebrations.



Maillon VERT et Fondation AGES Vieillir Mieux

In November 2021, seven pharmacies joined forces with Maillon Vert to alleviate seniors' isolation. Thanks to their mobilization and the generosity of their clients and partners, a donation of **\$7,125** was made to Little Brothers. In addition, training was provided for staff, in partnership with the Fondation Ages, to sensitize them to issues related to aging and the diverse realities of seniors.

On jase-tu? event in partnership with Bel Âge magazine

On June 4, Little Brothers participated in several activities as part of the *On jase-tu?* event. Our teams mobilized this year in Montreal and Quebec City and organized events in Laval, Trois-Rivières, Gatineau and Sherbrooke. The goal of this event was to bring people of all ages together for a cup of coffee, generously donated by Tim Hortons. More than 6,000 people gathered across Quebec for the 2022 edition and **\$7,500** was raised for Little Brothers through the sale of reusable coffee cups.

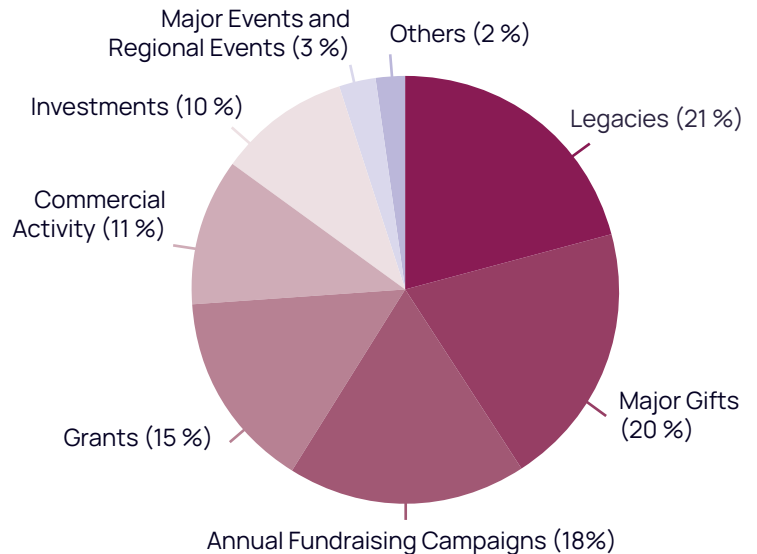

Little Brothers Foundation

The Foundation's financial situation was mainly affected by a decline in the market and the value of its investments. Other elements were similar to the previous year. The Foundation's contribution to the Corporation was higher than the previous year, due to continued investments in technology and increased programming. The Foundation will pursue the philanthropic transition initiated in 2022 and further support the Corporation in achieving its mission.
